


COLLEGE OPENS WITH EXCELLENT FRESHMEN CLASS

On September 15, 1975, Dr. Ronald P. McArthur welcomed the thirty-five students who comprise this year's freshmen class into the campus community. While noting that Thomas Aquinas College generally attracts the better students, he stated that he was particularly impressed with the overall quality of this year's class.

Dr. McArthur observed that while the College Board Scores of college bound students have been dropping in recent years (the current level is 920), the average scores of students applying to Thomas Aquinas College have been rising. This year's incoming

class averages 1105. Those now attending the college are among the top twenty-five per cent of college students in the nation.

SULLIVAN ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

At their June meeting, the Governors of Thomas Aquinas College elected Mr. Thomas P. Sullivan, a member since 1973, Chairman. At Mr. Sullivan's suggestion, the Board formed an Executive Committee to handle those items of urgent business which occur between quarterly meetings. Named to this committee were: Mr. John E. Schaeffer, Mr. Francis J. Montgomery, Mr. J. Edward Martin and the President and Vice Presidents of the college.

In addition to being President of Jefferson House, a Los Angeles Interior Design firm, Mr. Sullivan is President of the Los Angeles Cultural Heritage Association and active in other civic and cultural organizations. Mr. Sullivan, his wife, Chloe, and their two children, Daniel and Hilary, reside in San Marino, California.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT NAMED

Miss Tina M. Langone, a June graduate of Thomas Aquinas College, was named by Dean John W. Neumayr, to the post of Administrative Assistant for Student Affairs. Miss Langone's duties will include supervising dormitory prefects, coordinating student extra-curricular activities, and assisting in graduate placement and admissions work.

JOHN ROCHE KIELY ELECTED TO BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Mr. Thomas P. Sullivan, Chairman, has announced the election of Mr. John Roche Kiely to the Board of Governors.

Mr. Kiely, a graduate in Civil Engineering from the University of Washington, is a retired Executive Vice President of Bechtel Corporation. He continues as a Director of Bechtel, Inc. and Canadian Bechtel.

Mr. Kiely and his wife, Margaret, have five children. Their daughter, Mary MacLean Kiely, is currently in her junior year at Thomas Aquinas College. The Kiely's reside in Woodside, California.

Mr. Sullivan expressed the Board's pleasure with Mr. Kiely's willingness to serve. "A man of his unusual breadth of experience and superb reputation will be of real assistance to the college."
